


Above - Nathan Higgins Development of self-regulated learning: A longitudinal study on academic performance in undergraduate science

To me, the most thought-provoking message came from Dr Brian Dewsbury in his talk on the inclusive classroom. Dr Dewsbury presented compelling evidence for his approach of investing more time in getting to know the student cohort, even at the account of reducing course content.
